UPCOMING PUBLIC HEARINGS

The Town Council has been discussing several issues that have significance for property owners. Public hearings have been set for the following issues:

Revised noise ordinance

Public Hearings: Monday, June 4th

Final Council vote on Monday, June 18th

Stormwater utility ordinance (sets up utility, rates, payment process, exemptions)

Public Hearings: Monday, June 18th, July 2, July 16th

Tentative Council vote on Monday, July 16th

Traffic Flow for Chinook Road (Council's original plan for one way egress is being reconsidered)

Public Hearings: Monday, June 18th, July 16, August 1 (several hearings scheduled due to family's vacation schedule)

Tentative Council vote on Monday, Aug 20th

One of the major advantages to small town government is that everyone has a voice and has equal opportunity to impact decision making. The Council appreciates hearing from residents so mark your calendars and make plans to attend. Check the meeting agenda on the Town's website or reader boards for exact time.

TREE "CITY" USA *Elizabeth Walker, Town Arborist*

I am pleased to announce that the Town of Woodway has been designated a Tree City USA by the National Arbor Day Foundation and the Washington Department of Natural Resources. There are four standards in which to become a Tree City: 1) have a department that manages the trees in the community; 2) have a tree management budget of at least \$2 per capita; 3) have a tree protection ordinance and 4) celebrate Arbor Day.

In order to keep the title annually, the community needs to meet all four standards. With the Town's continued commitment to the Woodway Reserve and Stewardship Education, there should be no problem achieving the honor year after year. Please plan to celebrate Arbor Day in conjunction with the Community Fair scheduled for August 25th this year.

General Government

Held a public hearing on the Final Budget for 2007 and approved same. Received final copies of the Woodway History booklet done by former Admin. Project Mgr. Jack Collins. A representative from Snohomish County Cities and Towns Committee explained their goal to have more impact with State legislation. Council voted to support one of the members as an alternate to the Community Transit Board. Passed two resolutions approving 1% increases to the regular property tax levy and the Emergency Medical Services levy. Confirmed Kevin Fiske as the newest member of the Planning Commission. Discussed benefits, costs and outage scenarios in regard to undergrounding utilities with Regional Mgr. of the PUD. Confirmed Jennifer Ange to her second term as a Planning Commissioner. Issued a proclamation honoring the Port of Edmonds as 2006 Marina of the Year.

Public Works & Lands

Held several discussions and four public hearings regarding the stormwater utility and rate structures. Passed a motion by a vote of 3-2 adopting a stormwater rate formula. Held further discussions regarding a written rate policy and exemptions. Authorized a Professional Services Agreement with Damon Diesner to provide stormwater consultant services.

Land Use and Planning

Voted to accept the Park's Committee report regarding the Olympic Reserve and to incorporate portions of the Town Engineer's report into the Parks Plan. Discussed noise issues and proposed updated noise ordinance contents. Heard an update on the Brightwater sewage treatment project that covered timelines, tunnel boring, construction methods and marine protections at the outfall site.



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12 Weeks to Preparedness

Disasters, natural or otherwise, can strike any time, any place. Most people never consider preparing for the possibility of a disaster until it happens. Take these easy, manageable steps to prepare in advance.

Week 1: Food (per person)

- 3 gallons of water
- Extra water for pets, cooking, bathing
- Sandwich bread (freeze until needed)
- 3 Boxes quick energy snacks
- 2 Cans ready-to-eat soup
- 1 Box crackers
- Dry cereal
- 4 Cans fruit
- 5 Cans meat
- 4 Cans vegetables
- 1 Jar jelly or jam
- 1 Jar peanut butter
- 1 Large Can of juice
- Instant coffee/tea/powdered drinks

Week 2: Storage

- 2 Boxes large plastic zip bags
- Plastic wrap
- 2 Rolls aluminum foil
- Assorted plastic containers with lids
- 3 Boxes heavy duty garbage bags
- Waterproof portable plastic container with lid

Week 3: Health & First Aid

- 1 Bottle of shampoo
- 1 Box sanitary hand wipes/liquid
- 1 Large tube of toothpaste
- Antiseptic
- Deodorant
- Tweezers
- Adhesive bandages, assorted sizes
- Rolls of gauze or bandages
- Hydrogen peroxide

- First aid book
- First aid tape
- Petroleum jelly
- Rubbing alcohol

Week 4: Cleaning & Supplies

- 2 Packages eating utensils, paper cups, paper plates
- Facial tissues
- 2 Rolls paper towels
- 4 Rolls of toilet paper
- Liquid dish soap
- Mosquito repellent
- Matches
- 2 Pair latex gloves
- Broom, mop and bucket
- Unscented liquid bleach

Week 5: Medications

- Anti-diarrhea medicine
- Aspirin and/or acetaminophen
- Extra supply prescription medication(s)
- Adult vitamins
- Thermometer

Week 6: Common Tools

- Battery operated radio
- Flashlights
- Flashlight and radio batteries
- Assorted safety pins
- Scissors
- Screwdriver
- Pliers
- Vise grips
- Hammer(s)
- Heavy work gloves
- Stove fuel/charcoal, lighter fluid
- Camping or utility knife
- 1 Box disposable dust masks
- Plastic safety goggles



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Week 7: Heavy Tools

- Plywood & fasteners to cover windows
- Tarpaulin, canvas for temporary roof repair
- Handsaw and/or chain saw & fuel
- Assorted nails
- Wood screws
- Hatchet
- Crowbar

Week 8: Smart Supplies

- Batteries for camping lantern
- Battery powered camping lantern
- Portable camp stove or grill
- Video or disposable camera

Week 9: Special Items

- Special foods for special diets
- Extra hearing aid batteries
- Items for denture care
- Spare eyeglasses or contact lens supplies
- Leash or pet carrier
- Pet food
- Baby food
- Diapers
- Feminine products

Week 10: Helpful Supplies

- Games/activities for kids/family
- Extra radio batteries
- Local and state road maps
- Gas cans

Week 11: Everyday Safety

- ABC certified fire extinguisher
- Smoke detector with battery
- Carbon monoxide detector

Week 12: Make Plans, Get Trained

Start making plans

- Evacuation routes
- Neighborhood and out-of-area family meeting point
- Out-of-state emergency contact

Start getting training

- Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)
- First Aid/CPR
- Additional Red Cross training
